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Prof. Crispin Wright

Crispin Wright is a professional philosopher, specialising in epistemology and the philosophies of language and mathematics. He is currently Global Distinguished Professor of Philosophy at New York University and Professor of Philosophical Research at the University of Stirling. Previously he has taught at Oxford, Columbia, Michigan, Princeton, St. Andrews, where he was the first Wardlaw University Professor and founded the research center, Arché, and Aberdeen where he held the Regius Chair of Logic and directed the Northern Institute of Philosophy.

His books include Wittgenstein on the Foundations of Mathematics (Harvard 1980); Frege's Conception of Numbers as Objects (Humanities Press 1983); Truth and Objectivity (Harvard 1992); Realism Meaning and Truth (Blackwell 1986, 2nd editon 1992); The Reason's Proper Study (with Bob Hale, Oxford 2001), Rails to Infinity (Harvard 2001), and Saving the Differences (Harvard 2003).

The Riddle of Vagueness and Imploding the Demon, are currently in preparation for publication by Oxford University Press.

Career summary

Crispin Wright's researches have contributed to the philosophy of mathematics (neo-Fregean foundations); to metaphysics (realism, truth and ontology, response-dependence); to epistemology (scepticism, warrant transmission and epistemic entitlement); to philosophy of language and logic (vagueness, intuitionism, basic inference); to the philosophy of mind (self-knowledge), and to the study of Wittgenstein (rule-following and privacy).

He did his PhD at Cambridge before being elected Prize Fellow (1969) at All Souls College, Oxford, where he spent the first nine years of his career. He was appointed to the Chair of Logic and Metaphysics at St. Andrews in 1978, at that time the youngest ever appointment to an established chair in philosophy in the UK. In 1988 he was awarded a D. Litt.—a marker of published research of high distinction—from Oxford, and in 2003, an Honorary D.Litt. at the University of Aberdeen.

Wright's personal research awards include a full-time British Academy Research Readership (1990-1992) and a full-time Leverhulme Trust Personal Research Professorship (1998-2003.) He is Fellow of the British Academy (1992), of the Royal Society of Edinburgh (1996), and of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences (2012). He was appointed the first Bishop Wardlaw University Professor at St. Andrews in 1997.

At St. Andrews from the late 1990s onwards, Wright pioneered a distinctive and highly successful form of collaborative research in philosophy, leading a series of externally funded cutting-edge research projects which doubled as a training environment for early career philosophical researchers. He founded (1998) and, until 2009, was the Director of the Arché Centre at St. Andrews, which under his leadership earned more than the equivalent of £5 million of competitive British public research funding. In 2009 he founded the Northern Institute of Philosophy at Aberdeen, which he led until 2015.

He has taught at New York University, first as a Global Distinguished Professor, and then as Full Professor, since 2002. He resumed a half-time Global Distinguished Professorship from Fall 2014 which he combines with a Professorship of Philosophical Research at Stirling where he leads the John Templeton Foundation -funded collaborative research project, Knowledge beyond Natural Science.

Wright has served as primary supervisor for some 40 PhD students to completion of their degrees.

He is the founder and, with John Divers and Åsa Wikforss, a Principal Editor of the international journal of philosophy, Thought, published by Wiley-Blackwell since January 2013.
